Hi Erin,

A community member named [REDACTED] who said she lives in Derry called and talked to me this afternoon for about 10-15 minutes. She was reading the *Derry News* and explained that as a "parent and Christian", she is very concerned about how we advertised the YA Pizza Party & Carnival. She does not agree that students in 6th-8th grade should be called young adults because they are kids and their behavior does not typically reflect that of an adult. She believes "young adult" should refer to ages 18 through mid-20s. She suggested calling them junior high students or pre-teens instead. I responded that "young adult" is a typical term used by libraries when referring to literature and programming for students in grades 6-12, and we have used it for a long time including for a designated "young adult summer reading program". Then she said she's more understanding about it when it comes to reading, so I asked if she was more concerned about us using "young adult" to describe our intended audience for programs, and she said yes.

Further, she did not agree that we called the event a young adult party. She argued that the connotation of *party* is a negative one "under this administration/in this day and age". As a parent, she questioned that if a student was allowed to go to a library party, what's to stop them from thinking they're allowed to go to a party at someone's house? She suggested changing the event's description to some type of end-of-summer celebration.

I mentioned that library policy leaves it up to the parent to decide whether their student is mature enough to visit the library by themselves when they are 11 or older. I was going to compare our party with a "clean" party like a birthday or pool party (terms that parents commonly use), but I didn't go that far. She wasn't rude or yelling at any point, and she thanked me for the conversation/listening.

She provided her phone number and said she would be glad to talk about it with you further: [REDACTED]. I let her know you would not be available next week, so she would likely not hear from you right away. She mentioned that she had called Derry PL first, and I'm curious if they commented on how they use the term "young adult".

Director, thank you for your fulfillment of this 91a records request.

Can you clarify if there are any additional relevant records from Saturday August 19th 2023 responsive to this request? I see an email from Donna plante on Friday August 18th and which she states she would be happy to discuss this particular donation issue further depth the next day. I don't see any records relevant to that conversation in this enclosure.

Also, Per Donna plantes email on Friday August 18th, an individual specifically looking to donate works to circulation should be working with a member of the management staff in order to consider these works for addition to the library's collection. Like the citizen who donated the Tuttle twins works, I was explicit in my verbal statements to the director of circulation when I walked in and made the donation, that I did not want these books to be donated for sale, but added to circulation or returned to me. So when you consider the Croydon and Tuttle twins donations together, the library has established a pattern of behavior in which citizens particular donations are not being dispositioned consistently in accordance with policy.

Could you advise what you and other staff are doing to update and refresh all staff on the correct flow of donation policy?

Also, could you specify why I was denied the opportunity to work with a member of management to see that this particular item was added to the collection? Sounds like a discussion for a trustee meeting but I figured I would ask you first.

This shall include, but not be limited to, emails, meeting minutes, Trustee discussions, records of phone calls, handwritten notes, and any other work product generated by the Leach Library of Londonderry as part of declining adding this to the works available to be checked out. Please note that I do not need copies of emails between Erin Matlin and myself, Jonathan Esposito, as I already have reference copies of these documents in my possession. Not reproducing those emails should slightly ease the burden of fulfilling this government record request. The date scope of this request is: FROM: 1.1.23 TO: 8.25.23”

When responding to an RSA 91-A request, the Town complies with the definition of government records stated in RSA 91-A:1-a: any information created, accepted, or obtained by, or on behalf of, any public body, or a quorum or majority thereof, or any public agency in furtherance of its official function. Without limiting the foregoing, the term ‘governmental records’ includes any written communication or other information, whether in paper, electronic, or other physical form, received by a quorum or majority of a public body in furtherance of its official function, whether at a meeting or outside a meeting of the body. The term ‘governmental records’ shall also include the term ‘public records’

Thank you for your fulfillment of my government records request. I see emails between Library employees and yourself requesting to discuss this matter offline. Is there any reproducible work product from that offline conversation that should have been included with this release? Did you schedule a time to hold such a meeting, or take any notes? Just want to make sure that this request was comprehensively fulfilled. Any text/call/zoom records I should be aware of?

It is extremely interesting to me, and saddening, that the library, which should be an impartial Community institution, is playing the same transparency games that town hall does, intentionally keeping select conversations offline and out of the public view.

It is also extremely interesting that the citizen in question who donated the total twins works, had discussed with the head of the children's Library her specific intent that the materials be added to circulation. She did not receive the comprehensive policy breakdown that you all discussed here, and it appears that the director of the children's Library conveniently forgot that this was that citizens intent.

I do have one query that I will end with after a bit more community commentary if you would be kind enough to indulge me.

I appreciate that you were likely trying to be neutral and civil in your response but I found the response to be slightly lacking in regards to some of my queries.

I had specifically asked if New Hampshire libraries were currently failing to provide equitable access to all members of the community, to the extent that items of social justice headlined the entire association event. You somewhat vaguely responded that libraries across the country are likely facing this issues, but I was specifically inquiring if you were personally aware if these were hot issues that impacted New Hampshire libraries.

I am a patron of the Leach library as well as of other libraries in the area and while I am a Caucasian male, I am also a disabled veteran and the first child of an "off the boat" immigrant to be born here in America.

As a minority member of America's significantly varied population (less than 0.45% of Americans participated in the war on terror) and a member of a Federally protected class, I have not seen significant equity/equality of access issues in any of the surrounding libraries in southern New Hampshire, nor have I been made aware of any in other parts of the State. It does not seem that anyone can specifically identify areas of focus where New Hampshire, not national, libraries struggle with these issues.

I appreciate your highlighting The fact that Leach Library has a robust summer reading program. I receive the newsletters for both mainstream and child patrons and I'm looking forward to some of the summer reading activities myself.

I believe my specific commentary was that reading was not a significant focus of the library association, judging by the fact that so many breakout sessions were social justice oriented. You may have a robust summer reading program in place for our Londonderry Library but an overview of the topics at the recent association meeting showed absolutely no support for encouraging libraries to have robust reading programs like yours, in light of the national literacy issue that we are still facing with very young children post-COVID.

I know you did not craft the agenda for the association meeting but surely if the library is going to continue to pay public dollars into the institution, the association and affiliation should be a benefit to the citizens of Londonderry.

Could you clearly outline what tangible benefits the Londonderry Leach Library and patrons enjoy as a result of participation in the library association?

As a community member and taxpayer I do not feel that my library, which is an arm of my local public government, benefits from participation in an organization with such a heavy DEI focus, and I fail to see how such an association represents the concerns of Londonderry patrons...

Good morning,

The attached agenda for the 2023 spring conference and annual meeting was sent to me by a concerned member of the community. The highlights are not mine.

I recognize and am aware that I can occasionally be a contentious member of the community. I bear that background in mind as I reach out to you, because I greatly appreciate the Leach library and the work that you do, and I have always tried to keep my correspondence a bit less abrasive than it sometimes can be with other elements of local government.

Please know that if I ever reach out with a comment or inquiry, that it is 100% at face value and not my desire to rake the muck as it were.

That being said:

Some concerns from community members that were expressed to me are as follows:

1. Why does there seem to be one-sided bias on the content issue? There is an agenda item for fighting censorship through local advocacy, but censorship can sometimes be an overly broad term incorrectly applied to parental and community concerns regarding age-appropriate content and exposure to sexually explicit material.

I for one would rather see more ideas in the public sphere than less, even ones I disagree with, but I do feel that there is a tendency to expose our youth to ideas and conversations that, while some members of society may feel they are age appropriate and ready for, many other members of society do not.

Several community members are concerned that there is an agenda topic for fighting what the association deems as censorship, but where is the corresponding focus on age-appropriate content filtering? Is the association doing anything to be supportive to concerned parents and community members? Do they help provide guidance in having open and transparent conversations with community members regarding content that we do not believe should be readily accessible on the shelves at our local library?

2. Many community members are concerned about the breakout sessions. We understand that attendees likely have discretion as to which breakout session they attend and which would be most beneficial to their local leadership and library. That being said, it seems a touch excessive that five out of the 10 breakout sessions could be lumped under the umbrella of diversity, inclusion, and equity.

No one is suggesting that these are not important societal topics, and as libraries are an access point for community knowledge, we want to ensure that the knowledge and the access to it are open to everyone and meet appropriate state and federal guidelines for equality and inclusivity.

That being said, is there a significant diversity concern in and amongst New Hampshire libraries and their trustees? Are our public libraries failing to meet the diversity and inclusion needs of their cardholders, That there is such a heavy focus on this for breakout sessions?

Without painting with an excessively political or broad brush, The event agenda seems a bit progressive in nature, and in many community members opinion, fails to appropriately highlight What should be a key focus of our libraries right now: reading!

Obviously in this electronically driven age, our local library is focused on providing access to information through a variety of media, and not simply the written word as contained in a paper book.

That being said, we are in a time of national decline in education proficiency post COVID. It is the position of the federal department of education that a significant block of early readers and young learners will not have developed the basic building blocks to be successful readers by the time they hit primary school education milestones.

Perhaps I am just an uninformed and biased member of the community, but should we not have a greater focus on reading? On assisting our communities and our local school districts with access to reading programs that will help to fill the gap that we have identified is likely to occur in our most vulnerable learners?

Quite frankly, I see little to nothing on this agenda regarding promoting reading among young learners, which where I came from, was always a significant and central focus of the local library. It saddens me to see that this is not a focus of the trustee associations attention.

Perhaps some of these are concerns better relayed to the association itself but as our local library director, I felt you were good place to start.

Thank you for receiving my feedback and while a response is not required, I certainly welcome any feedback that you could kindly provide
